Dear Friends in Christ,

As we look back on 2025, my heart is filled with gratitude for all that God has done among us in the life of our church. It has been a year marked by generosity, faithful service, and deep fellowship. Through every season, we have seen the steady hand of the Lord guiding and sustaining us.

One of the great joys of this year was our Alpha Course. It was a privilege to see 20 people gathering week by week to explore the Christian faith, to ask honest questions, and to share their stories. Out of Alpha there have grown two new study groups, where conversation, prayer, and learning continue. It has been especially encouraging to welcome new members into our church family. Their presence, gifts, and enthusiasm have enriched our worship and strengthened our community life.

Alongside these joys, we have also walked through times of sadness. We have said goodbye to dearly loved older members of our congregation whose faithfulness shaped our church family life in countless quiet ways. Their contributions in prayer, service, wisdom, and love are treasured beyond measure.

We are also very grateful for the generosity shown this year. The faithful giving of our congregation has enabled ministry to grow and practical needs to be met. WORSHIP - PCC Link: Revd. Jane Mitchell

Our regular worship services are as follows:

Sundays weekly: 9.30am Informal service - Holy Communion 4th Sunday 11am traditional service - Holy Communion 1,3 and 5th Sundays.

Services Monthly: 8am Holy Communion BCP (second Sunday) and Evensong (3rd Sunday) Messy Church (second Monday)

Morning Prayer: In person Wednesdays 9am in church. Thursdays: on zoom link.
Friday worship Services at 10am. 1st and 3rd Fridays. Holy Communion.

Daily Prayer: The church is intentionally managed and left open for visitors as a place of hospitality and prayer during daylight hours. A theological lending library has been set up and open to all with a sitting /study area nearby.

Online worship: Live streaming was continued 3 Sundays out of 4 for the Informal 9.30am service and weekly for the 11am service. Thank you to the many volunteers who are actively involved in the smooth running of worship services. Thank you to all those who lead and preach or who are exploring training courses to learn.

School Worship: Jane has taken regular assemblies through the year at St Luke's School. The "Easter Experience" was offered with a team of volunteers from St Luke's church for children in years 2 and 5 this year as well as hosting the usual festival services in church at Easter, Harvest and Christmas. Jane as Vicar takes a leavers Service in St Luke's that is a special time for all.

The year 2025 was a deeply rewarding one for both the choir and for me personally. Among the many highlights were our augmented ensembles for Easter and Christmas, which brought together new and familiar faces to create the vibrant musical offerings that have become a hallmark of St Luke's.

A particularly beautiful moment came during our Nine Lessons and Carols service, when Maggi Ferris sang the solo verse of Once in Royal David's City with great poise and clarity. We also enjoyed several "firsts" this year. One was the premiere of A Blessing, a new anthem composed by our friend Wendy Stickley, which we sang at Evensong in March. Its beautiful words and melody were warmly received, and we look forward to singing it again at an Evensong in 2026.

Another new venture was the introduction of Saturday Lunchtime Concerts, held from time to time as a kind of "mission through music." Around 100 people from the village joined us for these short concerts, even lending their voices to a couple of hymns. Our first theme in October was Creation, followed by an Epiphany theme in January 2026. In June we will explore the theme of Gardens on the weekend of Sway Open Gardens. If you haven't yet experienced one of these concerts, do look out for the posters and join us for 35 minutes of uplifting music. I have received many kind comments about the choice of repertoire, the quality of the singing, and the sense of enjoyment they bring.

Finally, I want to express my deepest gratitude to every member of the choir for your dedication, enthusiasm, and hard work throughout the year. You truly bring music to life at St Luke's.

This keeps us updated as some may be ill at home or hospital or maybe coming to the end of life. New referrals may also have been requested. Communion is taken to those in Birchy Hill and Sway Place. Vicar Jane visits many, particularly those at the end of life and offers prayers and the anointing of oil.

Currently the Pastoral Team have been involved in a six-week living and death course. This was very well attended, extremely informative and very well received. We also ran an Alpha course which was well received and there were those that desired a post Alpha group which now meets every Tuesday evening.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES – PCC Link : Lizzy Smith

Over the past year, the Children and Families work at St Luke's has continued to develop and deepen, shaped by both significant change and strong, growing relationships across church, school, and community. There has been much to celebrate alongside honest challenges, and throughout it all the focus has remained on welcoming families, nurturing faith, and building connection.

Staffing and Roles

This year brought some important changes in staffing. Sophie is no longer in post, and Sara Willis has been appointed as Church Administrator. Sara has been a huge support to the life of the church, particularly to youth, children, and families work, and her encouragement, organisation, and willingness to help have made a real difference.

In September I also took on a paid role of four hours a week as Family and Community Support Worker. This has helped formalise and support work that was already happening and has enabled more intentional reflection and development across our children's and family ministry.

Alongside this, I am now teaching at St Luke's School on Fridays, meaning I am no longer present at Bump, Baby and Toddler on that day. Managing this from a distance has at times been challenging, but the team have adapted well and the group continues to run smoothly.

Bump, Baby and Toddler Groups

Bump, Baby and Toddler continues to go well and remains a key point of connection with families in the wider community. As is natural in volunteer-led work, there have been changes this year. A couple of volunteers have moved on as their children started school, and we are entering another period of change with one volunteer moving away and two others expecting babies.

We have welcomed a couple of new volunteers, which is encouraging, though it would be helpful to recruit one or two more people to support with setting up and packing away, particularly during periods of absence.

A significant development this year has been the near completion of the Forest Room. The space now has functional storage, a small workstation for children, and a sofa for quiet time and relaxation. It has already been used on Sunday mornings when there are only a few children present, and during Bump, Baby and Toddler sessions when older children attend, giving them space to craft, role play, and settle. Some finishing touches remain, including fitting a blind, and we will need to stay on top of keeping the space tidy, but it is already proving to be a valuable and flexible resource.

Open the Book

Open the Book continues to be a valued and well-established part of our ministry with children in school. This is thanks to the commitment, creativity, and faithfulness of the Open the Book team, who week by week bring Bible stories to life in engaging and accessible ways.

Sue Cornwell's leadership over many years has been central to this ministry. She has built a strong and reliable team and laid firm foundations that have enabled Open the Book to become a trusted and much-loved presence in the school. This year Sue has begun to step back from directing all sessions, while continuing to oversee, support, and encourage others as they take on more responsibility. This has been a positive and healthy transition, strengthening both the team and the sustainability of the work.

At the end of the year, children moving from Bump, Baby and Toddler into St Luke's School were gifted The Lion Storyteller Bible, which is used in Open the Book. This helped reinforce the strong links between church and school and supported children as they continue their faith journey.

Messy Church

Messy Church remains well attended, with a committed core of families. It is joyful, busy, and at times chaotic, and continues to require a significant amount of planning and volunteer energy. There have been some volunteer changes and challenges this year, and it would be helpful to have additional volunteers to help cover absences.

There have also been some real highlights. Three Year 6 children are increasingly taking on serving roles, including one who now supports the tech. A particularly special moment was seeing three Messy Church children act as readers at the Christmas Eve Nativity service, helping them feel truly part of the wider worshipping community.

Sunday Children's Provision

Provision for children on Sundays continues to be fluid and responsive to who is present each week. While this can feel unpredictable, it allows us to meet children where they are and include them meaningfully in the life of the church.

Church, School, and Community Links

This year I completed the Bishop's Certificate of Mission in Children, Youth and Families. This was a valuable opportunity to reflect on our strengths, and one recurring theme was the importance of strong links between church, school, and community. These links are currently a real strength at St Luke's. The church leads regular collective worship in school, Open the Book takes place weekly, I serve as a foundation governor, and I am regularly present at the school gate as a parent and in school weekly as a supply teacher. Together, this has created strong, visible, and trusted relationships.

We have also continued to build a strong relationship with Little Flyers Preschool, who moved into the Youth Centre in September. Having them literally next door has been a real gift. They have attended our Easter celebration, end-of-year celebration, carnival events, and

Christmas celebrations. They held their Christmas Nativity in church, took part in the Christmas Tree Festival, and visited for a session exploring the church organ. These shared experiences have helped deepen trust and connection.

New Developments and Change

Praise and Play has come to an end this year. Despite our best efforts, it never fully gained momentum and relied heavily on a small number of people. We tried it, it did not work, and that is okay.

Following the BCM, it now feels like the right time to introduce Bubble Church, a service specifically for under 7s and their families. With the continued success of Bump, Baby and Toddler and the strong relationship with Little Flyers, this feels like a natural next step. A team will attend training in March.

Outreach, Events, and Pastoral Care

Carnival Week was one of our most successful weeks of the year. We hosted a stall at the fête with activities for children and families, two under-5s events, and a Messy Church carnival event. All were very well supported and provided valuable opportunities to connect with the wider community. We also took part in the procession dressed as "Jesus is the Ringmaster" and were awarded second prize.

Other activities this year included a colouring competition as an alternative Halloween activity and a postcard exchange between Year 2 children at St Luke's School and children in Kibirizi, Rwanda. The postcards were delivered by the church in August, and the children in Rwanda have since replied. There is real potential to continue and grow this relationship.

In October we held a Baby Loss Service and created a prayer tree in church. Although attendance was small, the service was deeply meaningful and allowed us to support several Bump, Baby and Toddler mums who have experienced loss. It was a quiet, sacred moment of pastoral care and compassion

MISSIONS

Overseas Mission Report

St Luke's Mission Team has actively furthered Christian missional outreach in 2025 by fostering partnerships and strengthening ties with our Primary Mission Partners.

Rwanda Link Parish – Kibirizi, Kigeme Diocese

The parish's link with Kibirizi in the Kigeme Diocese continued to deepen over the past year. Early in the year, Jonathan undertook a short visit to meet Pastor Vianney and to see the encouraging progress on the new church building. This initial visit helped maintain momentum and strengthened communication between our two parishes.

In August, a larger group—Jonathan, Rosemary, Lisa Thomas, Kevin, and Vicar Jane—joined the Deanery visit to Rwanda. Their trip coincided with the Anglican Church of Rwanda's Centenary Celebrations, culminating in a major international gathering on 24 August in Gahini, the historic centre of the East African Revival. As part of the programme, the group visited Kibirizi Parish, reaffirming our long-standing partnership and offering support at a significant moment in the life of the Kibirizi Parish.

Fundraising activity across our parish remained strong throughout the year: A Mission Lunch, a pop-up charity shop, a well-supported garage sale, a mission brunch, sales of paintings by local artists and carol singing in the Hare and Hounds brought the community together in practical generosity. Through these efforts, one way or another, we were able to send over **£9,500** to Kibirizi, contributing to the rebuilding of the church and providing support for Pastor Vianney as the parish continues to recover from the enforced closures of churches in Rwanda.

The year as a whole strengthened our relationship with Kibirizi and demonstrated the parish's ongoing commitment to global mission and partnership.

Bev Cannon's Ministry in South America

A valued Mission Partner and former member of our congregation, Bev continued her mission work in Cuenca, Ecuador, alongside her husband Johnny, pastor of a local church. St Luke's provided financial support totaling £2,640, distributed monthly throughout the year. We were pleased to welcome Bev for an update on her work in early August. After the services she caught up with her supporters at a BBQ.

Kisiizi Hospital, Uganda

St Luke's longstanding commitment to Kisiizi Hospital—now extending over five decades—continued with steady and practical support throughout the year. Fundraising activity remained an important expression of this commitment. Janet Lealan's regular book and jigsaw sales in the Church Rooms provided a valuable stream of support. Sales of the handcrafted *Bags of Difference* at Christmas time raised over **£230**, and a further **£1,000** was allocated from Church funds to strengthen our contribution to the hospital's ongoing work. Together, these efforts helped sustain Kisiizi's vital medical ministry, which continues to serve some of the most vulnerable communities in south-west Uganda.

Other Mission Links

St Luke's distributed additional funds to Compassion (£300), Bible Society (£300), and Christians Against Poverty (£400) through its missional giving policy of 7% of regular giving.

Mission Sundays

Three Mission Sundays were organized to maintain congregation engagement with mission efforts. February 9th Rwanda themed service and Mission Lunch in support of Kibirizi Parish
3rd July Bev spoke at both of our services and BBQ
5th October Bible Society Tim Cosby spoke at both our morning services
Additionally, Bishop Assiel, from Rwanda, was with us for Evensong in October.

Future Plans

Through substantial efforts in fundraising, missional giving, and congregational engagement, St Luke's Mission Team continues to build bridges of faith and support that uplift communities locally and globally.

Home Mission Report for 2025

The Mission Team have a continuing commitment to organise events, speakers and the financial support for our Mission Partners. Last year St Luke's donated money to the Children's Society, Christian's Against Poverty, Kisiizi Hospital and our Partner Parish in Kibirizi. Our links with the Church Missionary Society comes through Bev Canon working in Equador with her husband Johnny. Bev's is due to retire mid-2026.

A highlight of the Mission Team's was a visit last year to Rwanda as it celebrated 100 years of faithful work and spread of the Gospel. Rev Jane Mitchell, Jonathan Elliott-Jones and (the now Rev) Lisa Thomas were a part of the visiting team,

Running parallel to these efforts the Mission Team have been focused on raising funds for Pastor Vianney's monumental effort to upgrade the church in Kibirzi according to government requirements. You may recall the pop-Charity Shop and lunches to raise money, and more is being planned.

ECO CHURCH - PCC Link: Wendy Collyer

The A ROCHA Eco Church survey was revised last winter and the new survey with more in-depth questions opened on 1 February 2025. The Church of England's Environment Office supports the A ROCHA survey and urges Churches to pursue Bronze, Silver and ultimately Gold status. The emphasis is now on all ministry areas within Churches and Cathedrals working towards the same Net Zero Carbon goals. The same five sections remain:

Worship; Buildings; Land; Community & Global Engagement & Lifestyle for the whole Church family to collaborate on.

St Luke's Church Sway remains on Gold in Worship and Land.

Our Worship and Prayer life focus in many ways and often on the natural world, Creation and prayer for God's help in restoring our Earth. Our Eco Church and Creation Care team together with our Gardening team ensure that Church land is cared for in a way that benefits both the Church's human family and its wildlife inhabitants & visitors. Selected parts of the Churchyard were planted with daffodil, cyclamen, tulip & fritillaria bulbs last Autumn. Also, snowdrops and bluebells (English) "in the green" (flowering & ready to plant out) arrived in February.

Re-pointing, lead work and other roof repairs were done last year and there is a real prospect of LED lights replacing old-fashioned high-consumption bulbs in the interior in 2026 following Quick Win grant-funding from the Diocese. All good news on the NZC (Net Zero Carbon) front, but there is still a need for several areas of basic insulation work to be done to cut draughts and improve energy usage inside the Church and other insulation possibilities in the Church Rooms.

During 2025, a CROP SWAP was trialled between Easter and September. At times, bundles of vegetables and bags of fruit were exchanged, but it was not the success we felt it could have been.

The GREEN Wall in the Church Rooms has been up since November 2025. It is a source of information and encouragement to parishioners and other users of the Church Rooms regarding climate and nature related information.

Wildlife and Info boards were added to the Churchyard. Some of these had been created by members of Creative Space.

The Eco Church team continued to meet up with other Eco Church and Creation Care teams around our part of the New Forest. We visited St Thomas Church, Lymington, St Nicholas Church, Brockenhurst, and St Andrews Church, Tiptoe, and exchanged news and information.

Our three Swift Boxes on the south side of Church were wired up in October by Hampshire Swifts volunteers, so that swifts can be called down between May and July each year. Swifts are attracted to nesting sites when they hear the sound of baby/young swifts in the vicinity.

Our Climate Services took place on 21st September in the period of Creationtide in the Church of England. Based on Romans 5: 3-5, the fifth video in a Tearfund series from Katharine Hayhoe: 'Speaking to other Christians about Climate Change' was included and this question was asked: What are the ways in which we can engage in the climate change debate and gently point people to Jesus? (Katharine Hayhoe is a Christian and Climate Scientist)

The Church Rooms kitchen now has a green recycling bin & food caddy. Outside we have black, green, 2x brown wheelie bins and a food bin.

Buildings Report

We maintain and repair the buildings and grounds always seeking best value as we work within the constraints of our church finances. All necessary routine maintenance has been completed along with regular ad hoc small repairs which we endeavour to do with volunteer labour. The brickwork re-pointing and roofing works were completed during the summer of 2024 which has had a positive impact on the penetrating damp which had been causing some concern. The final stage of the project – replacing the rainwater goods – was completed slightly under budget in spring 2025.

Due to personal circumstances, our Church Architect had to cancel the planned quinquennial survey with very little notice. This was rearranged in 2025 and his report has just been received -April 2026.
